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Main Issues in Austria

- German remedial classes (German as a Second Language/language of instruction for migrants)
- Language-sensitive content teaching
- Competence-orientation in language learning
- "Schule 4.0" (enhancing digital competence in the educational sector)
- Language Learning for Special Needs Students



Deutschförderklassen / German remedial classes

- New government with new programme focusing on the development of German skills due to lack of skills in the language of instruction, incoherent funding and non-compulsory nature of measures (up to 11 hours in parallel to regular schooling)
- PIRLS 2016 test results show **widening gap in reading literacy** between children with and without migration background
- Education standard test results 2016: 60% of mother tongue German speakers reach standards, but only 36% of children with German as a second language
- Statistical data show that a quarter of students across Austria and half of the students in Vienna speak a mother tongue other than the language of instruction (German) in academic year 2016/17

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Aims:

- 1) Systematic, intensive, compulsory German lessons for school students newly arriving in Austria or starting school
- 2) Linked to school readiness assessment based on objective and transparent standardized testing format for German (from 2019 on)
- Need for development of curricula for primary level and lower secondary level and standardized testing format for German
- Transition year 2018/19, full application of law from 2019/20
- Ministry expects approximately 80 classes




- German remedial classes:
 - Students without or non-sufficient skills at school entrance or newly arrived students (linked to pior school readiness assessment)
 - Minimum of 8 students
 - **School autonomy** with regard to organisation of classes
 - 15 hours/week at primary level, 20 hours/week at lower secondary level
 - Upt to 7 hours per week in linguistically non-intensive subjects like arts, sports, music in regular class
 - Duration of **one semester** (maximum 4 semesters), testing after each semester
- German remedial courses:
 - Students with sufficient skills to follow regular classes but need for additional support (or after successful participation in German remedial class)
 - 6 hours per week



Structure of German remedial classes
