This exam consists of two sections: *American Literature* and *American Culture*. Each section counts 50% of the final grade. Each section includes an open essay question and an essay with a didactic angle. At least one of your two essays has to be written on a didactic question. Choose ONE question from each section and write an essay of 1800 words (+/- 10%, not including any reference list used) for each question. Use the font Times New Roman, size 12, 1½ spacing.

Section 1: Literature (50%)

Write an essay on **ONE** of the two topics below

1. (Didactic question) Using the extract from the core curriculum in the Knowledge Promotion below as a starting point, write an essay where you discuss how extracts from *Funny in Farsi* can be used to work with identity issues in lower secondary. Use examples from the book. Then briefly explain how you would carry out a teaching plan didactically.

School shall support the development of each person's identity, make the pupils confident in who they are, and also present common values that are needed to participate in this diverse society and to open doors to the world and the future (Department of education, 2017, p. 6)

2. What is meant by 'the American Dream', and how did this dream develop? Has it evolved over time? Does it have the same meaning for everyone? And in your opinion, does it still exist today? With these questions as a starting point, write an essay in which you discuss how "the American dream" is presented in *Death of a Salesman* and *The Catcher in the Rye*.

## Section 2: Culture (50%)

Write an essay on **ONE** of the two topics below

- 1. Write an essay where you discuss the historical development of traditional American values in two or three of the aspects of American society below. Then give examples and briefly describe how the values can be seen in these aspects of American society today.
- a. Religion
- b. Business
- c. Education
- d. Government
- 2. (Didactic question) Using the excerpt cited below from the *Declaration of Independence* as a starting point, write an essay where you discuss African Americans' struggle for a place in the dominant American culture. Then describe how you would approach this topic in a self-chosen grade. How could you incorporate important aspects such as discrimination and racism? Refer to the new English subject curriculum and the core curriculum in your teaching plan.
